Performance Task Writing Rubric, Informational Writing

Correlating Points on the *Traits Writing Scoring Guides, Grades 3-5*

Organization/Purpose

The response has a clear and effective organizational structure, creating a sense of unity and completeness. The organization is sustained between and within paragraphs. The response is consistently and purposefully focused:

- controlling/main idea of a topic is clearly communicated, and the focus is strongly maintained for the purpose and audience

In his/her response, the writer:

- offers a clear, central theme that is memorable.
- narrows the theme to create a piece that is clear, tight, and manageable.
- is focused, coherent, and well organized.
- creates a piece that is easy to follow by fitting details together logically. He or she slows down to spotlight important points or events, and speeds up when he or she needs to move the reader along.

The response includes:

- consistent use of a variety of transitional strategies to clarify the relationships between and among ideas.

In his/her response, the writer:

- a variety of carefully selected sequence words and transition words, which are placed wisely to guide the reader through the piece by showing how ideas progress, relate, and/or diverge.

The response includes:

- effective introduction and conclusion.

In his/her response, the writer:

- grabs the reader's attention from the start and leads him or her into the piece naturally.
- sums up his or her thinking in a natural, thoughtful, and convincing way.

The response includes:

- logical progression of ideas from beginning to end; strong connections between and among ideas with some syntactic variety.

In his/her response, the writer:

- offers credible, accurate details that create pictures in the reader's mind, from the beginning of the piece to the end.
- uses various types of sentences (simple, compound, and/or complex) to enhance the central theme.
- stays on point and uses a compelling voice until the end.

Evidence/Elaboration

The response provides thorough elaboration of the support/evidence for the controlling/main idea that includes the effective use of source material. The response clearly and effectively develops ideas, using precise language:

- comprehensive evidence (facts and details) from the source material is integrated, relevant, and specific.

In his/her response, the writer:

- uses words with precision. He or she selects words the reader needs to fully understand the message.
- invites the reader to analyze and synthesize details in order to draw his or her own conclusions.
- provides unexpected or surprising details.

The response includes:

- clear citations or attribution of source material.

In his/her response, the writer:

- provides enough critical evidence to support the theme [and shows insight on the topic.]
- includes many [fascinating, original] accurate facts that are, when appropriate, linked to primary sources.

The response includes:

- effective use of a variety of elaborative techniques. (Elaborative techniques may include the use of personal experiences that support the controlling/main idea.)

In his/her response, the writer:

- uses many finely honed words and phrases. His or her creative and effective use of literary techniques such as alliteration, simile, and metaphor makes the piece a pleasure to read.
- makes clear his or her reason for creating the piece. He or she offers a point of view that is appropriate for the mode, which compels the reader to read on.

The response includes:

- vocabulary that is clearly appropriate for the audience and purpose.

In his/her response, the writer:

- uses words with precision. He or she selects words the reader needs to fully understand the message... chooses nouns, adjectives, adverbs, and so forth that create clarity and bring the topic to life.

The response includes:

- effective, appropriate style enhances content.

In his/her response, the writer:

- cares about the topic, and it shows. The writing is expressive and compelling. The reader feels the writer's conviction, authority, and integrity.

Conventions

The response demonstrates an adequate command of conventions:

- adequate use of correct sentence formation, punctuation, capitalization, grammar usage, and spelling.

In his/her response, the writer:

- carefully and creatively constructs sentences for maximum impact.
- handles basic punctuation skillfully. He or she understands how to use periods, commas, question marks, and exclamation points to enhance clarity and meaning.
- uses capital letters consistently and accurately. A deep understanding of how to capitalize dialogue, abbreviations, proper names, and titles is evident.
- forms grammatically correct phrases and sentences. He or she shows care in applying the rules of standard English.
- spells sight words, high-frequency words, and less familiar words correctly.
